2018 Program Highlights: Making an Impact in Our Community

Greenleaf is excited to share that we provided vital services to over 14,000 individuals in 2018! Learn more about how we are making an impact below:

Adolescent Suicide Prevention Program (ASPP)

Suicide prevention presentations were provided to students in 44 schools in the Akron area. We also provided school staff and community-based trainings for adults to assist in *identifying and responding to youth in distress*. ASPP completed a record 4th Quarter with **4,428** people in total served (4,392 youth, 36 adults). For the full 2018 school year, a total of **9,787** were served (9,343 students and 444 adults). Three Greenleaf staff also attended the *Signs of Suicide (SOS)* Certified Training Institute (through a grant by Medical Mutual) to learn how to train others in implementing the SOS curriculum in their schools.

Community Services for and of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (CSD) provides accessibility and empowerment to Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing individuals as the only program of its kind serving Summit, Portage, Medina, Wayne, and Holmes counties. We provided over **11,880 hours** of service in the areas of interpreting, case management, advocacy, summer youth programming and American Sign Language classes to over **1,000** individuals.

Behavioral Health (BH) counseling served an estimated **1,682** clients. Greenleaf provides *school based mental health counseling and anger management services* to children in the Coventry School District. Children are often referred by teachers and school counselors. School staff also promotes these services to parents at the school open house at the beginning of the year. In 2018, we provided services to more than **200** students enrolled in this district.Separately, we served about **500** clients in our *substance abuse program*.

Moms and Babies First was developed specifically to combat high *African-American infant mortality* rates in Ohio. The program mission is to provide support and community resource information, to

Greenleaf Staff Learn About Deaf Culture and Q.P.R. Suicide Prevention

On June 13th, Greenleaf staff welcomed members from the KEYS 4 Deaf Access Program funded by the Office on Violence Against Women. The KEYS team presented on Deaf culture, Deaf identity, the prevalence of abuse in the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community, and communication strategies when working with Deaf and Hard of Hearing clients. Greenleaf Family Center prides itself on the services delivered to the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community, not only in our Community Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing program but also in the agency as a whole.

Our own, Daniel Bennett, taught us about Q.P.R. (Question, Persuade, Refer), the most widely utilized, evidence-based, suicide prevention gatekeeper training in the United States. Through Q.P.R. training, participants learn how to recognize the warning signs of suicide, how to offer hope, how to get help and how to save a life. Q.P.R. trainings have provided millions of Americans with the tools necessary to prevent suicides in those around them. pregnant African American women living in Summit County, to ensure that moms and babies will remain healthy throughout pregnancy and delivery. Services were provided to **85** women, including **59** enrolled in WIC.Trained community healthcare workers conducted **217** postpartum home and clinic visits. Additionally, phone check-ins (**735**) were made with pregnant and postpartum women. There were **21** healthy babies born during the program year.



Program Highlight - CRAFT

Community Reinforcement and Family Training (CRAFT) uses an overall positive approach to help family and friends learn new techniques and solutions to help move their loved ones toward treatment and recovery. The program helps to build healthier relationships and improve overall quality of life while steering clear of conflict.

CRAFT research has shown that 7 out of 10 people who participate in the program are able to report their loved one attended treatment. If you are a concerned family member, significant other or friend whose loved one is an adult or adolescent drug or alcohol abuser, our CRAFT program has shown positive outcomes.

CRAFT therapists will help you:

* Learn positive communication strategies to improve the communication between you and your loved one

- * Improve overall mood and decrease your stress levels
- * Learn strategies that discourage your loved one from using
- * Discuss treatment options for your loved one
- * Learn to use new coping skills
